NJHS Induction

Twelve MCA students were recently inducted into the MCA chapter of the National Junior Honor Society. The NJHS recognizes and honors those students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of scholarship, leadership, service, character, and citizenship. To be inducted into the Millennium Charter Academy chapter of the NJHS, students must have a grade point average of 3.75 each year of middle school. Each student meeting this. criteria completed an application that included extracurricular activities and service projects. The MCA NJHS Advisory Board, which consists of MCA upper school teachers, reviewed the applications and then selected students according to the national requirements.



Students Compete Well in Mock Trial

Some upper school students recently competed in a Mock Trial competition in the District 7 regional competition held in Wilkesboro, NC. The case involved a student athlete who was competing in a college showcase tournament when she suffered an injury with concussion symptoms, of which, the coach was unaware. The student played in a subsequent game, and suffered another head injury which caused brain damage. The student sued the coach and soccer league on the grounds that the coach's and league's negligence caused the brain injury. MCA played both the roles of the defendant and plaintiff in this case, competing against Sparta Middle School, and won both trials! MCA's Mock Trial competition is a part of the Justice Iredell Middle School Mock Trial Tournament, which is an educational team program where middle school students have the opportunity to gain firsthand knowledge of civil/criminal law and courtroom procedures. Students representing attorneys and witnesses for both sides of a fictional case role play that case being tried in court. It is sponsored by the NC Bar Association.

MCA Spelling Bee Sets Record
