The new Paidea room is set up with beautiful artwork of Mary Cassatt, *The Child's Bath, and* Vincent Van Gough's *Starry Night*. We know, of course, the word "paideia" relates to our Paideia Seminars, student discussions based on the classical Socratic Seminar that features a collaborative, intellectual dialogue with open-ended questions about a text.

Students from kindergarten to twelfth grade are given a text to examine: a poem, a painting, a chart or graph, a short story, an essay, a word problem, a diagram, a map, a sculpture, or the description of a scientific experiment. With the class sitting facing one another, the teacher initiates the conversation to improve students' individual ability to think about and communicate in "a discussion of the ideas, the values, and the forms embodied in [the] products of human art." (Mortimer Adler) When engaged in a seminar, each student also experiences both the thinking process of other individuals and the collective thinking process of the group. Both can provide an educative model for transparent, flexible, and coherent thinking. The Paideia Seminar is also designed to support collaborative discourse, requiring students to practice complex social skills.
